For seven seasons, **Annie Potts '73** played the beloved Connie/Meemaw on the T.V. show *Young Sheldon*.

Young Sheldon is a spinoff prequel to The Big Bang Theory that follows Sheldon Cooper growing up with his family in East Texas. Annie played Connie, or Meemaw, Sheldon's fun-loving, sarcastic, patient grandmother. Craig T. Nelson, who played Connie's beau, Dale, had this to say about working with Annie, "She's very outspoken, mischievous, really funny all the time...She is a wonderful person to be around, be with, and act with." These are all characteristics of a Stephens alum!

Annie grew up on a farm in Franklin, Kentucky. When she was about 8, she got a taste of the stage. Annie participated in the Little Miss Franklin-Simpson County pageant, where she told a joke about her dog. While she doesn't remember details about the joke, she recalls she loved the embrace of the audience's laughter. In 1964, her family traveled to New York for the World's Fair. There, she saw her first Broadway show, *High Spirits*, which starred Stephens alum **Tammy Grimes '53** as Elvira Condomine.

Annie attended Stephens College, graduating in 1973 with a B.F.A. in theatre. After Stephens, Annie made her television debut in *Black Market Baby*; the following year, she would debut on the big screen in *Corvette Summer* as Vanessa, opposite Mark Hamill. She is best known for her roles in popular films such as *Ghostbusters* and *Pretty in Pink*. Annie starred in *Designing Women* as feminist Mary Jo Shively and voiced Bo Peep in the *Toy Story* franchise. Annie also performed on Broadway and debuted in *God of Carnage* in 2009. Of note is her Broadway appearance as Berthe in the Tony-winning revival of *Pippin*. Annie's list of awards and accomplishments is more than impressive throughout her 47-year career.

The ride's not over for fans of *The Big Bang Theory* and *Young Sheldon*. The spinoff (of the spinoff), *Georgie and Mandy's First Wedding*, following Sheldon's older brother, is slated for the fall. As for Meemaw continuing in the role of Georgie's grandmother in the new show – Annie says, "Well, I've not been formally asked... But they're aware that I'm a workaholic, and I love them. They're brilliant...Who knows?"

Looking ahead, Annie said she would do the right series, movie, or play and is considering a one-woman play.



Lauren recalls that during her Stephens graduation ceremony, President Lynch said, "Most of you will work jobs that don't exist yet." Those words echo in her mind constantly. She says her passion for sewing and the foundation of her Stephens B.F.A. in Fashion Design and Product Development has sent her further than she could have imagined.





Ann Maitland Burton '75 is a second-generation Stephens graduate. Her mother, Marion Pool Burton '45, was also an alum. Ann retired from Real Estate Investment Brokerage and 22 years of elected office at the second-largest public utility, Salt River Project, in Tempe, AZ. In Memoriam: Honoring the Lives and Legacies of Our Departed Stephens Family:





Nancy Pattison Fyfe Cardozier '45, creator of Sursum statue at Stephens College

Nancy Pattison Fyfe Cardozier was born November 18, 1925, in Covington, Tennessee, to Peter and Gracey Pattison McNeely Fyfe. She died on April 25, 2024.

She earned degrees from Stephens College, The Art Institute of Chicago, and Memphis State University, after which she taught art at various times to all grade levels, from elementary school to university. In 1955, she married Dr. V. Ray Cardozier, whose career led the couple to several academic posts.

As a volunteer, she lent her efforts to promoting the visual arts, serving as an officer and board member of the Texas Society of Sculptors for several years. She was also a supporter and a docent for the Umlauf Sculpture Garden and Museum.

Art was a talent she enjoyed sharing. Locations enhanced by her sculptures include the memorial garden of the First Presbyterian Church, Austin, the Austin Recovery Center, the First Protestant Church in New Braunfels, and several places in other cities, in both public and private collections, including Stephens College.

On October 15, 2006, Stephens College held a dedication ceremony for the Sursum statue, a 400 pound statue cast in bronze. Nancy had the following to say about Sursum: "At last, here she is on Stephens' campus, where I hope she will serve to inspire all who pass by to lift their eyes to more clearly see the world and their role in it, to lift their hearts toward the higher nobler things in life, with arms outstretched to embrace and celebrate life as it opens before them."

Linda Podas Chapman '65, '07, former Stephens Alumnae Board member



Linda Ellen Podas Chapman passed away on April 6, 2024, from natural causes after five years of battling multiple myeloma. Born on August 11, 1945, she was the youngest of four children of Minnie (Jerry) Irene Taylor Podas and Charles Robert Podas. Linda graduated from Washburn High School in 1963 and earned her associate degree from Stephens College, Columbia, Missouri, which she fondly called" the best two years of my life!"

In 1970, Linda married James Montgomery Chapman, with whom she had two daughters, Caroline and Melissa, before divorcing in 1987. She moved to Santa Barbara, California, where she became deeply involved in her community

through the Junior League of Santa Barbara, Braille Auxiliary, Music Academy of the West, and Family Service Agency. She actively participated in her daughters' schools, Laguna Blanca School and San Marcos High School, often serving on boards to be part of decision-making.

Linda worked at Sansum Clinic for over 20 years, first in Allergy & Immunology with Dr. Myron Liebhaber and then with the Clinical Research team, supporting Alzheimer's trials. Later, at 71, she worked at Northern Trust Bank in Montecito, where she cherished the camaraderie of her colleagues.

One of Linda's proudest moments was earning her Bachelor's degree in science, Cum Laude, from Stephens College in 2007. Her daughters, sister, and three beloved Stephens classmates attended the ceremony. Her diploma was presented by Dr. Wendy Libby, whom Linda helped recruit as Stephens' President. She served on the Stephens Alumnae Board and received the 2006 Stephens College Alumni Service Award.

Janice (Jan) Moses Durret '50, former Stephens College Trustee

'50 retained her wry, self-deprecating humor throughout her life, using laughter to soften life's hard edges.

Born October 27, 1930, in Junction City, KS, to George Gemeny Moses and Helen Marie Johnson, Jan grew up with a love for competition and tennis, which she played into her late 80's. She valued education, attended Stephens College (1948-1950), and earned a Bachelor's degree from K.U. (1950-1952) and an M.B.A. in 1980.

Jan married Warren Durrett in 1972; he passed in 2002. She was actively involved in the Kansas

City Jazz music community and utilized her M.B.A. to run Triangle Enterprises, managing Olathe Townhomes from 1982 until their sale in 2018.

Jan supported many organizations, including Stephens College, Kappa Kappa Gamma, The Village Presbyterian Church, League of Women Voters, D.A.R., NAWBO, NSWTA, and the Overland Park Racquet Club.

For the last five years of her life, she lived with her adult children and extended family on the West Coast, a precious time filled with her consistent, analytical guidance. Her granddaughter, Casey Jo Collins, described her as a" relentlessly social person," enjoying gatherings, good music, and cheering for her favorite teams: the Kansas City Chiefs, Kansas City Royals, and Kansas University Jayhawks.

Her three adult children survive Jan from her first marriage to Rush Scott: Sherry Scott Collins of Tacoma, WA; Alan Rush Scott of Prescott, AZ; and Linda Sue Scott with her wife, Terryl Tagg of Carmel Valley, CA. She also leaves behind her granddaughter, Casey Jo Collins, with her wife, Sarah McLaughlin, and great-grandson, Cosmo Wesley Collins, born December 21, 2023, whom she held at five days old. Other survivors include her grandson Josh Damon, his son Kai, and granddaughter Tanny Scott of AZ.
