"Stephens College has truly been my life's work,"
President Lynch told her community in announcing
her plans. "It has been a privilege beyond measure
to be a member of this extraordinary, missiondriven community."

She will continue to lead through May 2025 as the College implements block scheduling, a pioneering curriculum shift to prepare students for careers in an Al-dominated world.

Board Chair M. Anne Murphy '78 lauded Lynch's transformative leadership, recognizing her profound impact on the College's academic programs and campus culture. Lynch's accessibility to students, petfriendly campus initiatives, and a generous supply of snacks have endeared her to the community since she arrived in 2009.

Lynch's tenure has been marked by significant achievements, including securing the largest donation in Stephens College's history and spearheading the establishment of various academic programs such as the School for Health Sciences and the co-educational Conservatory for the Performing Arts. She also oversaw renovations to campus facilities, transforming Sampson Hall into a state-of-the-art medical facility and revitalizing the Okoboji Summer Theatre campus into an artist's village.

Beyond Stephens College, Lynch has been a prominent community leader, receiving accolades such as the Athena Award and the Distinguished Service Award from the Columbia NAACP. Her impact extends nationally through her leadership roles in organizations like the American Midwest Conference of the NAIA and the Lillian Lodge Kopenhaver Center for the Advancement of Women in Communication.

As Lynch prepares for retirement, Stephens College reflects on her legacy of innovation, community engagement, and educational excellence. Plans for commemorating her tenure and transitioning leadership will be unveiled in the coming months.

Stephens College Alumni Weekend 2024



April 11-13 was a beautiful weekend on campus, and we welcomed alums from classes spanning 1956 to 2023. The Crossing the Bridge Ceremony for the Class of 2024 symbolized the seniors' upcoming transition from students to alumni, underscoring the continuity of the Stephens community.

Later that day, during the Alumni Awards Ceremony, the College honored **Kristin Atwell Ford '91** with the Alumni Achievement Award, celebrating her Emmy-Award-winning career as a filmmaker and **Sally McClure Jackson '56** for her nearly 70 years of service to Stephens and the Equestrian Program. The evening culminated in the Ten Ideals Ball, a fairytale-themed gathering that enchanted all attendees.

Saturday's State of the College Address by President Dianne Lynch provided an overview of the challenges facing private higher education and outlined Stephens College's innovative strategic responses, including the adoption of a block program launching in Fall 2024, the addition of new academic and certificate programs, the strengthening of athletics, and a focus on affordability for students. Her address was particularly significant since, on Thursday, she announced her retirement in May 2025 after 16 years of service. This revelation added a poignant note to her speech as she reflected on her tenure and Stephens' trajectory towards future growth and the College's adaptation to the educational needs of students.

President Lynch's forthcoming retirement stirred deep reflections among the alumni about her impactful leadership and the foundation she has built for her successor. Her updates and strategic vision have bolstered alumni's confidence in the College's direction and plans for continued success and a promising future.

The weekend continued with the 80th-anniversary fashion show "The Collections" and the Conservatory for the Performing Arts Senior Showcase, each highlighting the impressive talent of today's students.

The Stephens Promise: Free Tuition for Eligible Students



Beginning in the fall of 2024, the Stephens Promise program will provide up to four years of free tuition for full-time students whose annual adjusted family income is less than \$75,000, a cap that reflects Missouri's median family income of \$71,520.

To qualify for The Stephens Promise, students must have

a GPA of 3.3 or greater, be residential students, and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) annually. The program will be available to all current, new, and transfer undergraduate students who meet the criteria.

For many students, the Stephens Promise means they could graduate from college debt-free. "We are delivering on our promise that students and families who need to take on college debt won't have to," said President Dianne Lynch.

Unveiling New Cross-Cultural Experiential Learning Program



Stephens will launch an exciting new dimension in our educational landscape this fall: a comprehensive cross-cultural experiential learning program to enrich our students' academic journeys.

To weave cross-cultural understanding throughout every aspect of student life, this interdisciplinary initiative will span academics with career and personal development by embedding culturally immersive experiences into the fabric of our living and learning experience.

Study Abroad Italy (SAI) is the flagship of our cross-cultural offerings, featuring the course BUS386: Global Markets. Led by Business Program Chair **Dr. Scott Taylor** and Associate Vice President for Student Experience and Director of Cross-Cultural Studies **Alex Bryan**. This course will take place during the second block of the fall semester and promises to be an adventure that will transform how our students engage with the world.

Participants will have the chance to experience firsthand Italian culture, journeying through the historic cities of Milan, Florence, and Rome. This isn't just a tour; it's a total immersion into the Italian way of life, where every street corner, every meal, and every conversation is an opportunity to grow and learn.

SAI goes beyond the traditional classroom setting. Students will interact with local entrepreneurs and delve into sustainable business practices across a variety of industries. From the artisanal craftsmanship at a leather factory to the traditional techniques employed at a winery, from cheese production to organic farming, our students will gain firsthand insight into international business and marketing strategies.

Beyond the professional sphere, the SAI program is brimming with cultural activities. Students will tantalize their taste buds with Italian cooking classes, unravel the stories behind historic landmarks on guided city tours, and stand in awe within the hallowed walls of cathedrals and art museums. Iconic sites like the Colosseum and the Roman Forum will serve as classrooms, offering lessons in history and humanity that can only be learned through experience.

Students will broaden their horizons, enhance their personal and professional competencies, and embrace a myriad of perspectives. At Stephens College, we believe in education without borders, learning that transcends the traditional, and experiences that last a lifetime.

On April 18, the Doris Spiegelberg School of Health Sciences held its Spring Research Conference, maintaining its annual theme related to animal research and science; this year was The Day of the Horse. Students from each Health Science program presented posters and platform presentations showcasing their original research. Engaging in conducting and presenting research allows students to develop skills in project management, problem-solving, and data analysis. This kind of academic pursuit is essential preparation for future careers in the health sciences.

Each year, the conference allows students to participate actively in a highly professional scholarly conference. They present their research and respond to feedback from conference attendees. These interactions offer opportunities for valuable insights and discussions. Stephens is dedicated to ensuring that all students have opportunities to work directly with faculty on original undergraduate research, leading to graduates better prepared for careers or further education than those at larger institutions.

The day also served as the official launch of the WiSR (Women in STEM Research) program, showcasing a partnership with our flagship Equestrian program, our new Animal Behavior degree, and the University of Missouri College of Veterinary Medicine.

New Animal Behavior Program Enrolling for Fall 2024



Known as the pet-friendliest School in the nation, Stephens College is creating a groundbreaking new academic program that intersects animal behavior with practical, non-riding applications for horses. The program demonstrates our commitment to diversifying animal-related education.

A Bachelor of Science in Animal Behavior (ABe) is an interdisciplinary program focusing on the scientific understanding of animal behavior and human-animal interactions. Utilizing collaborations across several academic disciplines, bridging psychology, health sciences, and equestrian studies, Animal Behavior is a comprehensive educational experience to meet today's industry demands.

Students in the program synthesize insights from biology, psychology, animal science, and other disciplines into a comprehensive scientific understanding of animal behavior. Students are encouraged to tailor their program to suit their intellectual curiosity and professional goals, and they take part in numerous immersive and hands-on activities that promote their development as leaders

in their disciplines. Stephens College's superb equestrian facilities and commitment to the health and welfare of companion and service animals are foundational aspects of the program.

An ABe degree prepares students for careers in a wide variety of professional settings, including in training and shelter facilities, veterinary clinics, equine Facilities, Welfare Organizations, Research Institutions, Zoos, Museums, and wildlife and conservation organizations.

Animal Behaviorist jobs are in demand and expected to grow 8% from 2018 to 2028. On average, dog trainers in the U.S. earn over \$59,315, while behavioral specialists earn \$117,760 per year. Pet psychologists earn \$84,660, while zoologists earn \$57,700.

Stephens Celebrates New Center of Excellence for Veteran Success



At Stephens College, we believe that every American veteran deserves our gratitude, respect, and support. But we know that women veterans often face unique challenges. That's why we created Mission Promise Kept: to empower women veterans to earn college degrees, achieve personal success, and attain financial independence.

Mission Promise Kept is the first comprehensive college program designed to meet the full spectrum of living and learning needs of women veterans. Participants and their children live in newly renovated on-campus apartments and receive the wraparound support they need to thrive through a coordinated network of programs and services.

On Friday, April 12, **Mission Promise Kept**, led by Executive Director **Elizabeth Herrera**, and Stephens College celebrated the grand opening of a new resource center for veterans with a ribbon-cutting ceremony. The Center of Excellence for Veteran Success in Stamper Commons will serve veterans of all genders and provide a place to gather, study, and share their experiences. The Center was funded by a \$600,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

ATHLETICS RISING TO THE TOP



Stephens Basketball Stars Journey to the NAIA

The Stars' historic season came to a close on March 16. However, the Stars' journey to the NAIA was marked by a season of commanding performances, securing the American Midwest Conference Championship title, winning 12 conference awards (see award winners below), and their first-ever appearance in the NAIA tournament. The team finished the season with a 21-6 overall record (16-2 AMC) held in Indianapolis, IN.

As the No. 9 seed in the Naismith Quadrant, the Stars defeated the University of Pikeville (Ky.) Bears in the first round with a final score of 84-69. In the second round, the Stars took on the overall No. 1 seed, Marian University Knights, on their home court. Despite a valiant effort, they lost 49-63, bringing a bittersweet end to their historic season with an overall record of 23-8.

"Our journey doesn't end here. It's a stepping stone for greater achievements next season. We've grown from this experience and only plan to come back stronger and more determined than ever," Head Coach Andre Bell said about the season. "We are grateful to the board members and our president for making this all possible. Hopefully, the rest of the basketball world knows who [we are] and where Stephens Stars Basketball resides."

Fewer than 15 percent of skilled workers in high-demand trades are women.

The program will offer comprehensive training, mentorship, certifications, and wrap-around support to women seeking to enter dynamic and rewarding industries such as construction, carpentry, highway construction, and more. It will provide networking, mentorship, career development resources, and technical training. Enrollment is open to women of all backgrounds and experience levels. This uniquely-Stephens program will also be free of cost. Weekly stipends will be provided so that students can put 100 percent of their focus on learning. Conservatory Students Recognized at KCAC Theatre Festival









Notably, Elizabeth's appearances on two of the island's most-watched television shows, "Jugando Pelota Dura" and "Noticentro al Amanecer," garnered national attention, amplifying their message and extending their influence across Puerto Rico.

A highlight of their visit was a productive meeting with the team from the Puerto Rican Secretary of Education. Together, they developed strategies to effectively reach school counselors throughout the island, ensuring that young women are aware of the opportunities offered by Stephens College. This collaboration lays a solid foundation for future partnerships, marking positive initial steps from Elizabeth and Mel's journey in Puerto Rico.

Their efforts have yielded promising outcomes, with twelve prospective students expressing interest in Stephens College programs, and one student has already applied and been accepted. These early successes fuel Elizabeth and Mel's determination to deepen their involvement and support within the Puerto Rican community.

Looking ahead, Elizabeth and Mel are focused on nurturing these relationships and expanding their presence in Puerto Rico. They are committed to concentrating their efforts effectively to maximize their impact and empower more students to pursue their educational aspirations. With dedication and perseverance, they are confident that their endeavors will create transformative opportunities and forge meaningful connections.
