Dr. Remley is a widely published author in the area of legal and ethical issues in counseling and is the co-author of the textbook used in our course Ethical and Legal issues in Counseling. This year, faculty members Dr. Kissinger and Dr. Irvin presented a roundtable addressing the key partnership between site supervisors and counselor training programs, with an eye on optimizing the site supervisor experience for site supervisors and supervisees through support and training.

2024 Spring Research Conference



2024 SPRING RESEARCH CONFERENCE

Hosted by the School of Health Sciences

The School of Health Sciences hosted their annual Spring 2024 Research Conference across campus, where undergraduate and graduate students from across SHS presented their research. This year's theme was **Day of the Horse** in celebration of Stephens' Equestrian program and the new Women in STEM Research (WiSR) program that Stephens College is launching in Fall, 2024. The 2024 SHS Research Conference showcased the research of many Stephens College School of Health Sciences across our graduate (Physician Assistant, Counseling) and undergraduate programs (Biology & Life Sciences, Nursing, & Psychology).

This year, Kate Wagoner (pictured), a student in the CMHC program, collaborated with Dr. Kissinger in presenting a poster on Equine-Assisted Therapy (or Equine Therapy/EAP/EAT). This type of modality involves therapeutic strategies that engage clients and horses under the dual supervision of an equine specialist and licensed mental health professional. Their poster introduced EAP/EAT, with special emphasis on its distinctive history, academic/professional training, therapeutic uses (i.e., treatment of anxiety/depression) and strategies/interventions, how to find/select qualified EAPs/EATs. The poster also highlighted career opportunities and local EAPs/EATs.

Next year's SHS conference is just around the corner and focuses on the "Intersection of Wellness and Science". This topic is a great opportunity for Counseling students to get involved. Be sure to talk with your instructors and advisors if you have ideas for presenting. Additionally, more information will be provided closer to the conference in April-we hope you will attend-we expect to have at least one prominent counseling professional as a keynote speaker-you won't want to miss it!

Mission Promise Kept @ Stephens College Dedicated Support for Women Veterans

What was the inspiration for Mission Promise Kept at Stephens College?

Mission Promise Kept at Stephens College provides specialized support and resources for women veterans. It offers tailored support, including free on-campus childcare, access to dedicated programs and resources, and a community that values and understands their experiences, ensuring a successful transition to academic & professional life.

What should we know about women's roles and experiences in the military and as veterans?

Women play diverse roles in the military and as veterans, including combat positions and leadership roles. They face unique challenges such as gender-specific issues, discrimination, and barriers to advancement. Specialized healthcare and mental health support are needed to address experiences with gender discrimination, sexual harassment, and military sexual trauma. Many women veterans juggle caregiving and parenting responsibilities, highlighting the need for supportive programs. Creating an inclusive community and tailored support systems like Mission Promise Kept are crucial for empowering and supporting women veterans.

What do you see as key benefits of the program & challenges?

Mission Promise Kept offers tailored support programs for women veterans, including free on-campus childcare, housing that accommodates pets and children, and access to the Veteran Center for academic and mental health support. The program also provides activities and networking opportunities for peer connection, mentorship, and leadership development. However, the program faces challenges as women veterans manage multiple responsibilities, making it difficult to balance academic and personal commitments. Providing ongoing specialized care for mental health needs, ensuring awareness and access to benefits, and sustaining adequate funding present ongoing challenges despite these obstacles.



Anything else you believe we should know

It's important to consider the impact of Mission Promise Kept on the campus environment and the veteran community. By creating a supportive atmosphere for women veterans, the program benefits its participants and enriches the campus as a whole. The program's focus on gender-specific issues and providing comprehensive support highlights the unique needs of women in the military and can inspire similar initiatives across other institutions. Regularly assessing participants' experiences and challenges helps improve the support provided. Involving women veterans in shaping the program's offerings can lead to more tailored solutions and a stronger sense of community. Ultimately, programs like Mission Promise Kept empower women veterans and facilitate their successful transition to civilian life, contributing to the larger goal of ensuring that all veterans receive the respect, support, and opportunities they deserve.
